A New Beginning for Hirwaun Community Church...

The old Zion Baptist Church in Hirwaun has a new name, a new leadership and new life!

In recent times, Bryn Sion in Aberdare have partnered with the Association to form a missional steering group at Zion Baptist Church in order to ensure a Baptist witness would continue in the village. A Commissioning Service was held on 11th May at Bryn Sion to send out a small team to begin a new work under the leadership of Nas and Alys Awad.

Nas says, "Our heart is to reach those in our community who don't yet know Jesus and to build a welcoming space where people can explore faith and find hope, healing and freedom."

It has been a busy and hugely encouraging time since then. Whilst extensive repairs are taking place at the Zion building, they have been meeting fortnightly on a Sunday afternoon at the local YMCA Coffee Shop – holding informal services, sharing food and exploring gospel truths around tables.

Midweek Bible Studies have regularly attracted more than ten people with up to seventeen joining to explore God's word together.

"Beyond our regular meetings, we've been actively involved in community life, taking part in local events, such as open mic nights, youth groups ...

Welcome!

One of the great privileges I have in my role as Regional Minister is the opportunity to travel around the churches, chaplaincies and missional communities of the Association and hear how God is at work.



And the good news is, God is most definitely moving! Recent years have brought many challenges to churches, perhaps most typified by financial pressures and fewer volunteers to support the many good works going on in the church. However, amidst this background, we are seeing God at work; He is on the move!

Again and again we are hearing reports of baptisms. There are people turning up at services who have had no previous connection with the church. And this move of God includes the younger generation who are exploring a new interest in faith. Add to this, we are seeing new churches being planted – some through individuals with a heart for planting and some through churches with a vision for reaching out into a new area. God is on the move.

As I reflect on this my mind is drawn to this verse from Isaiah, "Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?" (Isaiah 43:19). Life has been difficult for the people of Israel. The powerful Babylonians have invaded and defeated them. People have been forcibly moved from their homes and relocated to other parts of the Empire. And in this difficult situation they asked questions: Had God abandoned them because of their sin? Was he really all powerful? Are they actually special to him? Is there hope in the future? Will God move again?

And Isaiah gives them hope: God has not abandoned them; God has not been defeated; God is all powerful and His people are special to Him. Behold, He is going to do a new thing! God is on the move!

Whether church life and our personal lives are encouraging or difficult right now, we can hold out hope in the midst of all that is happening. God is with us! God is on the move. God is doing a new thing. Perhaps the pertinent question is, 'Can we perceive what He is doing'? As we look around us, can we see God on the move? What is He doing in our church and community? What is he doing in our own lives? God is on the move!



On Saturday 4th October, people gathered at Albany Road Baptist Church for the opening ceremony and thanksgiving service for their new community facility. The old building, riddled with damp, has been transformed into a hall on the ground floor which can be divided into three sections, and two floors above which provide twelve flats of affordable housing.

This project has been a great example of partnership and vision. Unable to afford redevelopment of the building on their own, Albany Road Baptist Church were creative in their approach, partnering with 'Cadwyn Housing Association' and 'Faith in Affordable Housing'. Cadwyn bought the building and have redeveloped the flats. The church pays a peppercorn rent for the ground floor and were also responsible for the cost of redeveloping this space. The result is a new suite of facilities – in addition to the hall, there is a modern kitchen, welcoming café space and even shower and clothes washing facilities.

Jeremy Ray, Church Treasurer, was able to give thanks for God's provision as he shared how the project was paid for both through selling the original building and various grants received. It meant the church had to raise little themselves, enabling them to concentrate on the vision. Peter Littlechild, Community Coordinator, was able to explain the visionary thinking behind the project—in particular the aim of providing a community



accessible for all people. This includes making it a disability friendly space and offering essential facilities for the homeless. Additionally, the hope is to create greater financial security for the church as they rent out space.

Inside the new hall

Richard Hardy, minister of the church, brought three wine bottles that looked identical to illustrate their hope for the future as he read from Matthew 9:16-17 about putting new wine into new wine skins. The first bottle looked good on the outside but had nothing in it, explaining that they didn't want the buildings to just look good on the outside – what happens inside is important. The second bottle contained a cheap juice, which suggests the church could fill the building with any activities. However, their aim is to do something more than that – to ensure that much of what goes on in the building is a blessing to the community. This is the third bottle – one that not only looks good but has a good taste as well!
